

#### Middle Island Development

Nine years ago, our Middle Island plans took an enormous hit when the Environmental Protection Department classified our long-term development as a "Designated Project", which therefore had to go through a full Environmental Impact Assessment. The reasons were various, but the size of the reclamation, possible need for dredging, the existing sewage system and the moorings were the roadblocks. In fact, according to them, everything was a huge concern.

After nine years of visual impact, marine life and traffic assessments; considerations of potential changes in tides due to our reclamation, along with concerns about coral; a possible antiquity assessment; the four redesigns of the hard stand; and investigations of the infamous amphioxus, it all came down to "Humm!! Maybe you did not have to do all that". Indeed, on 30 June 2023, regulations regarding designated projects and reclamation in Hong Kong changed in our favour, placing us outside all restrictions contained in the new ordinance.

Today, the proposed new reclamation occupies an insignificant area of the Deep Water Bay waters. Both reclamation and piling works will not require dredging. The proposed onsite sewage treatment plant has a smaller capacity than the regulation states, as effluents will be discharged via an outfall on the seawall instead

of being reused. The proposed floating pontoon will provide mooring for less than 30 vessels.

So, after all these new infrastructures designs, imposed changes and unstinting work by the Committee, we do not have any Designated Project elements any more, and therefore we hope not to undergo the EIAO process approval. We are now waiting for EPD confirmation, while also moving ahead with section 12a, and are in touch the Town Planning Board for the right to finally build.

#### Dress with sense while in the Club

# HOUSE COMMITTEE UPDATE:

# Ongoing Work to Improve our Much-loved Clubhouse

Thank you to all members for the positive comments received about the plans for improving our much-loved clubhouse. As with all construction work, sometimes things take a little longer than expected, and so it has been with the replacement of the "services spine" and refurbishment of toilets. We had originally hoped this work would be completed by the end of summer; it will now be nearer the end of the year. I am pleased to say that the contractor has been appointed and work will have started by the time you read this article.

#### What you will see?

- The Anchor outside the clubhouse will be temporarily covered for protection in its current location;
- Protective hoarding will be constructed in front of the clubhouse, on Shum Wan Road;
- For a limited time, in phases, access to the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floor toilets will be interrupted; and
- The final product will be the first part of our newstyle renovations, updating the Club's look and feel.

#### What can't you see?

- The contractors will be installing new service pipes from the top of the building to ground level;
- New pipe connections will be made through the exterior wall;

- Once work is complete, all of the old water supply pipes and drainage pipes will be removed; and
- Work will be carried out to completely remodel and modernise the washroom services.

#### How long will the work take?

The original schedule for all the work was 153 days. For much of that time, the work will be out of sight. We are aiming to have the refurbished washrooms in operation before the start of the pre-Christmas busy season.

#### What other work is going on?

This is just the first of several initiatives to improve and maintain our beloved clubhouse. We will soon be making improvements to the coffee shop, in particular to improve the acoustics so that it is not so "noisy" inside.

We are also starting the design for an improved main entrance, staircase and reception area, to reinforce the members' welcome experience that the ABC is known for.



Upcoming Work: Spine & Toilet Renovation Work 2023

Work to be done: The services of the toilets on 3/F and 2/F will be intermittently suspended due

to re-routing of pipeline from the roof to the external wall in September 2023. Renovation works for 3/F toilet will be done between October and November and 2/F toilet will be done between November and early December respectively.

What you will see:

During the work: Four-storey hoarding on the external wall on top of the historic anchor.

On completion : Some new pipes and new toilets!

Work Schedule : 20 August 2023 to 20 December 2023


We should all celebrate and commend our two young sailors for their hard work, dedication to the sport of sailing and perseverance as international athletes, without omitting the very professional coaching they received.

ABC regrets to report that Jon Casson passed away suddenly in southwestern France on the evening of Sunday 2 July. The funeral was in France on 7 July, with his wife Carole and their daughter Sara in attendance. Jon was 77.

Born and brought up in Surbiton, south west of London, UK, Jon studied and qualified as a quantity surveyor. After working in various projects and roles in London for five years, Jon and Carole first came to HK on a visit to friends in 1976. They loved it so much that they returned 18 months later in mid-1978. Jon joined the HK Government's Architects' Office of the Public Works Department as a quantity surveyor, working on hospitals (including the Queen Mary Hospital extension), and the development and

refurbishment of schools. Jon later transitioned to work with a contracts consultant.

Carole recalled, "Jon had always been interested in messing about in boats - dinghies on the Thames, cruising yachts on the Norfolk Broads and a few cross-Channel races from the Hamble but when we discovered the warm waters of the South China Sea and the beautiful HK coastline we were hooked for ever. In HK, it started with a Hobie Cat on Stanley Beach, then a small Yamaha cruising yacht & on to sharing the Peterson 33, Tamarisk. We joined ABC in (March) 1981 and Jon gradually became more involved in the running of the Club through various committees, becoming Commodore in 1987."

Jon had joined ABC shortly after the official opening of Phase 1 of the Shum Wan Road development in September 1980. This phase consisted of the first two floors of the main clubhouse, carparks, pool and squash courts.

He soon became actively involved in ABC's Phase 2 development, which involved the addition of the third floor and the ground floor coffee shop and kitchen, the terrace above the G/F kitchen, and a children's play area. Using his quantity survey knowledge. Jon put in a huge amount of valuable work for the Club on the project. He joined the General Committee in the early 1980s, and actively supported the planning, design and construction stages of the Phase 2 project. Jon became Vice Commodore in 1986, then Commodore in 1987-88. He stayed on the General Committee until 1990. Jon and Carole were also part of the editorial team for the first ABC history book - Aberdeen Boat Club Hong Kong 1967-1988.

Motorsports was another of Jon's enthusiasms, and in the 1979 Rothman's Rally in HK, he was Clerk of the Course. He was also a member of HK Hash from 1979, for a few years. He did one return China Sea crossing, on *Tarquah V* with Carole, Stephen Davies and Elaine Morgan and other ABC members - a voyage with considerably rough seas. In Hong Kong, Jon also sailed with Peter Ford on *Shogun*, and with Eric Liddiard on *Quinella*.

Jon also contributed to race management - following earlier work on cruiser handicapping on a programmable calculator by Stephen Davies, Jon developed his famous spreadsheet that dealt with the ABC Portsmouth Yardstick (performance adjusted handicapping, which was then becoming popular) Club racing results, and post-1986 also for the CHS, (now IRC) results.

As Stephen recalls, Jon's spreadsheet's first major outing came about to handle a formula for working out the results of the motoring division of the 4 Peaks Race in 1986. This was then used pretty much unmodified for the 1987

San Fernando Race; the first outing of the Luzon Cruiser Race, which also allowed the use of engines. Once that had worked so well, Jon adapted the system to handle the sailing results for the ABC winter series results in around 1987 or 1988, and this computerised results system was adopted by the other clubs, with Jon generously sharing his time to help them with their results.

Those days marked an early heyday for the ABC's racing, with up to 30 boats competing in series races, and perhaps 10-15 visiting boats parking on the Club's pontoons, to share post-race beers and stories in the main bar!

Jon became an Honorary Member in the mid '90s and subsequently moved with his family to live in the village of Saint-Crépin-d'Auberoche, a commune in the Dordogne area in Nouvelle-Aquitaine in southwestern France, returning to visit friends in ABC a few years ago.


Carol continued: "We spent some very happy times at the ABC - on and off the water - it was an important part of our HK lives - this includes daughter Sara too, lots of wonderful memories. Jon's ABC Commodore's flag was beside his coffin, under a photo of him in Race Officer mode, at his funeral."

Jon Casson, a good friend, member of the Club and the community, sadly departed. Commiserations from ABC.



You might remember that the ABC started partnering with Foodlink – a local charity delivering surplus food to people in need – when Hong Kong was hit with the severe third wave of covid during January last year. At the time, they had halted distributions of cooked food, and needed help with repackaging rice. We reached out to members, and 40 bags of rice sent to us were repacked within a mere couple of hours.

Since then, we have continued supporting Foodlink, including as the Covid situation eased and they recommenced distributing food to the needy, including to many families in Ap Lei Chau and Aberdeen that rely on food donations. We started by sending them daily packed meals, fully supported by our generous ABC members.





As the situation and business returned to normal and our partnership with Foodlink was starting to grow, we worked with them to donate our leftover cooked food from large functions and buffets to people in need all over Hong Kong. The amounts donated per month have varied, with a recent high of 23kg in June this year – equivalent to 55 meals.


Sadly, amounts like this represent only a fraction of what's needed, as Foodlink notes that over 1.6 million people live below the poverty line in Hong Kong, and nearly two-thirds of poor households are in the state of "food insecurity". We will further support Foodlink, in turn benefitting many people in need, and would welcome further food donations.

#### **Light Breeze Before the Storm**

Given the anticipated light winds and the high ebbing tide, one course for all was chosen in the vicinity of Bluff Head Light and Castle Rock for Race 5 of the Aberdeen Boat Club's Summer Series 2023.

Starting in the usual area between Round Island and Repulse Bay, the course took the fleet past the Tai Tam Club Mark (s), around Castle Rock (s), back to the Tai Tam Club Mark (s), and back to Castle Rock, where the race was shortened for all. Tables for the seafood lunch were pre-booked at Po Toi.

With the ABC's utility boat *Shun Fung* out of commission the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club's *Hector Ross* had been made available as the committee boat.

With his normal assistant race officer, Jennifer Li, on leave (although remotely helping with results) the race officer, Alex Johnston, was relatively shorthanded on *Hector Ross*, though ably assisted by Dai Fuk and two boat crew from the RHKYC.

With a breeze of barely four knots, Alex avoided laying a windward mark, allowing the fleet greater leeway in escaping Repulse Bay and Round Island.

At 10:30, the four IRC 1 and one IRC 2 (Zesst) hit the line, with Neo One and Parnassus leading the pack.





Five minutes later, with the breeze now six knots from 135 degrees, the eight HKPN A and four HKPN B boats followed. In HKPN A the J/80 Jahoo! was almost OCS but just dipped back in time to avoid a penalty, whilst Easy Breezy II led HKPN B off the line. Having signed up late for the race, Triple A brought up the rear.

In IRC, the Neo Roma 430, *Next*, was the first to round the Tai Tam Club Mark, followed by the Neo 400+, *Neo One*, the Sydney 38, *Manbude*, the Sunfast 3600, *Zesst*, and *Parnassus*.

The J/80 Jahoo! was the first HKPN A boat to round the Tai Tam Club Mark and head for Castle Rock, chased by the Beneteau Oceanis 331, Crystal, and the Beneteau First 40.7, Sea Eagle.



On the horizon, a rainstorm was visibly approaching; it reached the Tai Tam Club Mark just as the Jeanneau SO 409, Boss, the Beneteau 43, Five O One, and the Dehler 42, Triple A, closed on the mark, adding some thrill to their roundings as the wind gusted at 16 knots. The rain had intensified, drenching the crew on the Beneteau Sense 46, Generations, as they rounded, as well as the media and Sai Fuk on the runabout.

Neo One was the first to cross the shortened finish line in IRC 1, to take line and handicap honours. Parnassus beat Next on handicap for 2<sup>nd</sup>. Manbude retired shortly after the passing of the storm.

Zesst took the daily double in IRC 2.



To much celebration, *Jahoo!* comfortably took the gun for line and handicap honours in HKPN A. *Sea Eagle* finished 2<sup>nd</sup> with *Crystal* 3<sup>rd</sup> on corrected.

Five O One and the J/80 J Chi both retired, the former particularly struggling against the tide in the lighter airs that prevailed after the storm.

The last six boats to finish also struggled before a 6-knot breeze kicked in to see them home. Having persevered, *Water Rabbit* claimed line and handicap honours, followed by *Shun Shui* and *Easy Breezy II* 3<sup>rd</sup>.

A misunderstanding by *Daydream* saw them initially attempt a second rounding of Castle Rock before being guided by Alex to the finish line. However, on their approach they went too close to a squid boat, briefly snaring its anchor before fortunately freeing themselves.

After a particularly challenging Race 5, race officer Alex was pleased that 14 of the 17 entries had finished. Bottles of wine were then delivered to the revellers on Po Toi, where prizes were awarded to at least those crews in attendance.








# Mediterranean Style Mooring – ABC Middle Island Pontoons

Mediterranean moorings are usually stern-to, and occasionally bows-to, the pontoon or quay. Boats usually moor stern-to the pontoon for ease of access ashore; however, when unsure of the depth, going bows-to will keep your drives in deeper water. Alongside berthing is normally only available at fuel or waiting pontoons.

Stern lines are used to stay close to the quay or pontoon, whilst either the anchor or a line from the bow holds the boat away. When the quay is high, as in many places, a passerelle or wooden plank, carried by the boat, is used to go ashore. However, the good news is this is not needed for the ABC pontoon at Middle Island, if the boat goes stern-to.

#### How to berth on a Stern - To Mooring at ABC Middle Island.




#### The approach to the Pontoon

Do not use your anchor - sinkers and chains are on the seabed, and will foul your anchor.

#### Please use the Red Mooring Buoys and the attached lazy mooring lines provided.

- Rig up fenders on both sides of the boat and a large fender on the stern.
- Rig a stern line from both aft quarters Port and Starboard.
- Prepare the boat bow line & boat hook to pick up the Mooring (Big Red Buoy) bow mooring lazy line.
- Go slowly astern in reverse about two boat lengths away from the pontoon, pick up the Mooring buoy (Big Red Buoy) bow lazy mooring line and attach your boat bow line, through the loop and back to the boat. One end of your boat bow line should already be attached to the boat.
- One boat length from the pontoon, stop easing the boat bow line. Be ready to ease out more boat bow line, if required.
- Connect the windward stern line to shore, followed by the leeward stern line.
- Once positioned the correct distance from the pontoon, take the strain up on the boat bow line. To ensure the stern stays away from the quay/pontoon often the stern lines are eased and the boat bow line tightened, then the stern lines made taught again.



#### Crosswinds

In a crosswind, it may be necessary to initially reverse into wind to get steerageway.

- When slightly upwind of the gap, pick up the mooring buoy (Big Red Buoy) lazy mooring line and attach your boat bow line, and reverse into the space.
- Ensure the leeward side is well fendered, in case you drift onto a downwind boat.

#### **Onshore wind**

If the wind is on the bow, treat the stern-to mooring as a normal berthing exercise.

• Pick up the mooring buoy (Big Red Buoy) lazy mooring line and attach your bow line.

- Gently reverse astern into the gap, with the stern lines ready.
- One boat length away from the quay, ensure the boat bow line is sufficiently tight.
- Connect the stern lines.

#### Leaving the pontoon

- Run your stern lines back on board, around a cleat on the dock.
- Start to leave the pontoon, remove your stern lines; as you move forward, drop one end of your boat bow line and pull it back through the Mooring buoy lazy mooring line loop – be careful not to run over your boat bow line and foul your prop.
- Ensure you have sufficient roving fenders on both sides of the vessel to avoid any contact.

#### **Some Important Tips**

- <u>Do not berth your vessel alongside the main section of the ABC MI pontoon.</u> This prevents all other boats that wish to use the pontoons from going stern-to.
- Please see the below an incorrect example displayed by the white catamaran:



<u>Correct</u> example of boats berthed stern-to on the ABC MI Pontoons:



- Do not use your anchor there are mooring blocks and chains on the seabed which your anchor will get fouled on.
   Please use the Red Mooring Buoys and attached lazy lines provided.
- If the space looks too small for your vessel, it probably is, so do not try and force your way in. This applies to many power boats, which tend to be much wider in the beam than many sailing yachts.
- If you are on the inside of the pontoon, port side or starboard side – berth as normal as for any pontoon. You do not need to use the Red Mooring buoy/ lazy line.
- Sailing Yachts need to be careful that the rigs to do not get entangled, if alongside each other.
- Always brief your crew first before attempting to dock. Do not try and do the briefing once you start your manoeuvre into the pontoon!!
- Stern-to moorings are used very successfully all over the world, and especially in Europe where space is limited in many harbours and marinas. 
