• The expression of sorrow for someone's death

Now that we are clear about the meaning of these two very soundalike words, let me remind you of some historical greatness of the Aberdeen Boat Club. In order not to embarrass anyone or create a commotion and impinge on egos and testosterone, I shall not use names or qualifications.

A bit prior to my employment in 2003, the leaders of ABC decided to let go 15 moorings (at the very least), from the stock we had with MARDEP (ie, the good stock).... Time passed, and the need for extra moorings, especially for racing sailing boats, increased but our moorings were full.

In 2008 I personally, without any approval from the higher authorities (good times in those days), applied directly to Mr. t.... at MARDEP Aberdeen for 13 recreational moorings for the Club, to rent back to our members, exclusively for the sport of sailing.

Well after many years of reminders about the request, enquiring of the position on the waiting list, begging for help, and miscellaneous events, I may confess (for proof see earlier issues of Horizons; lawyers may have a good read) ... nothing happened.

Then, in January, out of the blue we were suddenly offered 6 Club Moorings in the Aberdeen Typhoon Shelter. What a great and unexpected surprise – especially after 16 years of waiting and rejection.

The surprise and pleasure were very short, when we were told that these 6 moorings had to be only for ABC company held boats the size of dinghies. Something must have gone wrong, somewhere.

We were also given, after 16 years of hopes and

expectations, 2 weeks to formally apply for mooring GPS, and 2 weeks to install the sinkers and buoys. It takes six months to get a quotation and build new moorings; so there was already something smelling bad here.

Anyhow, after many phone calls and apologies, multiple trips were organised to verify the potential GPS location of the new moorings (*just in case the earth had shifted in her inclination overnight*), numerous forms were sent and delivered to the HK Marine Department (*usually repeating the same questions*), then an additional 2 separate trips were made into the Aberdeen Typhoon Shelter to precisely record GPS positions and to ensure that earth is not flat. And finally ... the Club and MARDEP agreed on 4 moorings for Club boats only.

Now, you may think this story is over and done. But, NO!!!!

As these are new moorings, we now have to install different sized chains (big as my fist) and seabed sinkers to comply with MBA packing, MARDEP trained *sailors* who calculated precisely with all knowledge available but without any sea experience that our current maximum 12–17 metre x 168/ x 84 fore–aft moorings range, which have already been in place for 6.5 years, now require 2 x 12 tonne mooring sinkers (double the weight of anything already in in the shelter) and chains of a size only seen on the *Titanic*'s anchor.

To me, there is no doubt whatsoever that the whole process has been deliberately set up to make it as difficult as possible, so the new mooring applications will be dropped –hoping that we would let go and abandon the typhoon shelter to more expensive and lucrative developments, such as reclamation and buildings in 10 years from now, notwithstanding this would be the type of accommodation that no one will be able to afford.

GENERAL MANAGER'S LETTER

GYM RENOVATION PROJECT

After receiving comments about the ageing state of the equipment and the need for new and different machines, the Club decided at the last budget preparation in June 2023 to slightly improve what we have to offer. Subsequent suggestions for additional improvements were added to the primary budget, to make the Gym more modern and fresher. Our cardio machines, already second hand, require more maintenance, particularly with the electronic systems. The mechanical parts can still be maintained but they are slightly outdated compared to the newer generation of members' training style, requiring targeted muscle groups training and higher weight capacity.

As the Gym is well used, making the equipment more suitable and safer prompted us to aim for replacing and improving the old equipment. The plan is as below.

Unfortunately, the amount of money allocated to this project has been fixed prior to receiving any quotations, at HK\$80,000 for 2023/2024, HK\$ 80,000 for 2024/2025, and HK\$80,000 for 2025/2026.

Yet after receiving various quotations, the entire renovation with new flooring, sound, general look and feel and equipment is about 3 times more than expected; and we will implement the project in phases over a longer term.

This year, we will only get the heavier free weight and one leg press and rower; remove the outdated back press or the pectoral press and TV; and do some painting & decoration for HK\$76,000, with equipment purchases totalling HK\$80,840. In 2025 we'll add a newest cardio machine, costing around HK\$68,100, and renovate the overall floor, spending a total of HK\$ 88,220. And finally, in 2026, we shall complete the equipment replacement for HK\$ 98,700, and finish all minor work professionally, bringing the total for the year to HK\$168,000.

Hence, the overall cost will be rather more than expected, but will provide a far better Gym. So bear with us, and the result will be fantastic, with a limited impact on our cash flow.

Deliver the best possible, wellequipped and safe Gym. We are slightly behind this point today.

Considering a 3-year plan. We need to add a leg press and heavier free weights. The TV is now redundant and should be removed. Better WIFI is needed for high-speed connectivity. Last but not least a more holistic service and premium look and feel is generally needed.



- Image improvement by providing a better venue.
- Responding to Members requests.
- Service improvement by providing personal training sessions.
- Ensure safety, by providing reputable and professional outside maintenance by a certified company.

MIDDLE ISLAND DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

What is happening:

After the approval of 6 years of hard work to achieve an agreement with the Environmental and Protection Department, we have finally started Section 12 A of the project, and started again reviewing the entire ABC Scope of work and tuning our cost expectations.


The ABC Scope and Cost review commenced in January 2024, with a main objective being obtaining the Right to develop Middle Island, allowing amendments to the design agreed with EPD. The review will also cover all final designs, to support the original objectives subject to affordability and optimising usage of available funds. But increased storage, the realignment of the ramp and the provision of improved training facilities will be the priorities. Later, we shall explore the opportunities to retain and improve the clubhouse, and plan stages for construction required by the development.

So there will be a busy 2024 until September, with the hope of being in a position to apply to the Town Planning Bureau (TPB) for Section 12 A rezoning. TPB endorsement of Section 12 A may take 4 to 6 months; allowing us to submit a draft Outline Zoning Plan (OZP), which is a kind of statutory plan prepared by the Town Planning Board under the Town Planning Ordinance. This is basically a plan that shows the land-use zonings of individual planning scheme areas, for approval in March 2025.

Once all this is done, all that will remain is the Approval of the Foreshore & Seabed Gazettal, taking us to December 2025 and finally –fingers crossed, burning candles and making offerings – we may start the construction in early 2026.

The construction will be in phases in 6 areas, first building IIIA and IIIB without interruption of our operations. The remaining phases may need further funding.

As we are still reviewing cost issues, it is not possible to give a reasonable estimate of the entire project. What is it certain is that we will start to build the hard stand for which we are funded, and move to the rest as money comes in.



GENERAL MANAGER'S LETTER

GROWING WEED IN DEEP WATER BAY

No, I am not talking about that "recreational weed", but a Marine Restoration of Seaweed and Seagrass in medium term stages.

Since January, the Club has taken part in an ecosystem restoration project in Deep Water Bay.

The objective is to restore the marine ecosystem and biodiversity along the south side of Hong Kong Island, initially by reintroducing indigenous seaweed, then followed by seagrass. Hopefully these artificially enriched nurseries will quickly bring back other marine life and species. The ecosystem situation is quite bad along the south coast of Hong Kong Island. After years of poor marine and fishing management, the seabed is more like an underwater desert – barren with very little marine life and littered with trash from increasing numbers of big boat users.



Who are the first stakeholders? They are led by the Rotary Club of HK South PPE Chair, George Li; scientifically supported by HKU Swire Institute of Marine Science Associate Prof. Bayden Russell; with Aberdeen Boat Club providing logistics and operations support.

Each year, from January to June a group of five experienced divers will endeavour to re-introduce



seaweed and seagrass in 5 pilot test sites along the south side between Deep Water Bay and South Bay. The project involves 5 species of Hong Kong seagrass (*Halophila beccarii, H. ovalis, H. minor, Ruppia maritima* and *Zostera japonica*) and 40 species of seaweed (*Sargassaceae* brown/red/green algae, *Sargassum* spp.) which are common at Stanley, Clear Water Bay, Sai Kung and Tung Ping Chau.

Marine algae including seaweeds are important because they:

- Provide essential nursery habitats for fisheries and other marine species and thus protect food sources.
- Play a vital role in capturing carbon, producing at least 50% of Earth's oxygen
- Provide food, protection and shelter to other marine creatures
- Clean the sea by hosting many planktons and diatoms
- Reduce coastal erosion
- And, finally, can become a source of nutrients for humans

This is in fact the second project supported by the Club in Deep Water Bay; the first is in collaboration with the Harbour School Seaweed Initiative project. The students are investigating seaweed growing for their own school project, inspired by a documentary titled 2040, which explored innovative solutions to the climate crisis. In November, they deployed a small homemade temporary seaweed farm slightly east of the ABC Middle Island pier. I am sure you have seen that funny looking square floating on the eastern part of our pontoon. This project will end in April, and I am sure that we will have a report on their findings, which could be useful to the other project I described above.

Our project to improve and upgrade the main club house continues, with our team working hard behind the scenes as we design and cost the next phases of work. Behind the scenes we still have pipework to and we are working on a new changing room for female staff.

There is a logic to the sequence of work, and the next phase will start to revitalize the main entrance, staircase, and 1st floor Galley restaurant. The details are still being worked out, you can see computer generated renderings of the entrance and coffee shop possibilities are shown below. I would like to thank especially Anna Rees, who is helping the refit committee with her extensive professional design expertise.

In the Galley we will be improving the acoustics so it is less noisy, and with a fresh new look. We need to replace the patio flooring owing to leakage and so it makes sense to do this work in the same time frame.

We have also started to form a working group to look at the 2nd Floor "Four Peaks Restaurant" and "Waglan Bar". Both venues are popular, and we regularly receive comments and suggestions from members. Should we retain a "Fine Dining Restaurant"? Do we need to expand the Waglan Bar? 
While all this is going on, another working group including members Sunil Talwar and Tyron Truong are using their professional expertise to help us improve the audio-visual provision in the club.

The first Four Peaks Race was held way back in January 1985. It started in Junk Bay and covered Ma On Shan, Lantau Peak, Mt Stenhouse and Violet Hill. It was put together by the noted author and sailor, Stephen Davies, and was based on the British Three Peaks Race. Since then, it has been kept to a similar format, with the start moved to Shek O and, in the 1990s, to Tai Tam Bay. The order of the peaks has changed intermittently this year the sequence was Ma On Shan, Violet Hill, Lantau and Stenhouse.

The Four Peaks Race is more than a race - it's a physical and mental challenge and, without doubt, one of Hong Kong's great sporting events. Not only does it put incredible demands on the competitors but the level of organisation required is staggering. This year, more than 40 volunteers consisting of scrutineers, timekeepers, peak officials and control room staff, made sure that all went according to plan for the 19 entrants and some 150 sailors and runners.

Not forgetting the lavish prize-giving the following Friday, with the Club's F&B division swinging into action to serve prize-winners and their guests a never-ending flow of Italian-themed dishes and delicacies - all included in the race entry fee of HK\$2,288!

This year, the Solaris Four Peaks Race 2024, the 38th edition of the race, saw 19 boats enter with 18 showing up in Tai Tam Bay on Saturday, 27 January, for the staggered starts at 10:30, 10:35 and 10:40. Sadly, Crystal didn't make it.


Race officer Gideon Mowser welcomed competitors while the outer distance mark was being laid. Ten minutes later, the gun for the five IRC entries was fired. At 10:30, in a clear start, Stefan Fillip's Neo One and Glenn Smith's Wild Card led the division out of Tai Tam Bay. Juice, Arcturus+ and Wicked followed in 6-8 knots of easterly breeze.

At 10:35, the seven-strong PHS A division was released, with Philippe Moriau's Rhy & Rue leading the way. Six boats in PHS B took off at 10:40, with the breeze holding steady.

















The runners from the J-99, *Juice*, put in a strong performance up and down Ma On Shan to record a Let-go time of 01:25:33. *Wild Card's* team put in the second fastest time, with *Neo One's* Ainhoa Mombila & Hyan Chang coming 3rd with a Let-go time of 01:36:06.

By this time, the number of boats still in contention was 15 – Lewis Cerne's *Wicked*, Steve Metz's *Illusion* and Wayne Robinson's *Sawadee* had thrown in the towel.







First boat to drop its runners at the next peak – Violet Hill – did so a long way out. In fading light, *Neo One's* Ainhoa Mombila & Thomas McManners had a time-consuming (and tiring) trek across Chung Hom Wan to the Repulse Bay Public Pier. This possibly contributed to their disappointing 5th for Violet Hill. Tonny Chung's *Foxzhead* did well to record a 3rd behind Andy Pidden's *Juice* and *Wild Card*.

It was dark by the time *Neo One* offloaded its runners on Lantau Island, followed by *Wild Card* and *Juice*. After an amazing one and a half hours, *Neo One's* Hyan Chang & Thomas McManners passed through the Lantau check point to record a Let-go time of 01:36:41. *Juice* recorded a 2nd and newcomer, *Rock Steady*, chalked up a 3rd in one hour, 43 minutes and 45 seconds.

Mt Stenhouse on Lamma Island was the last and possibly trickiest of all four peaks. In the past, runners have been 'lost' on this 353-metre climb where, in parts, it can mean ascending on all fours depending on route taken. After *Wild Card's* Callum Brechin & Frank Weyn chalked up an impressive Let-go of 01:27:26, Norman Ngao & Mayank Vaid's 01:33:52 for *Rhy & Rue* did skipper Philippe Moriau proud. In 3rd, another new name, *Arcturus*+, showed that girls can do it too – Fiona Cheung & Yan Pui Ha recorded a Let-go of 01:41:00.

FOUR PEAKS RACE 2024 AND BEYOND

Introduction, by John Currie

As I step down from my Race Chairman position, which has been a very rewarding experience over the last 5 years, I can reflect that this year saw a pickup in team entries, which almost made the 20 mark. It was refreshing to have four new entries within the competitive fleet across IRC and PNS divisions. Highlights I'd like to mention:



Interest from England saw two fell [hill] runners on Rock Steady, who participate in the UK's 3 Peaks Race, which our event is modelled on. Pushing the limits, Team Insanity participated on *J80 Jelik;* plus Eszter Csillag from Yacht Juice ran all 4 peaks, winning the Atlanta's Anchor award.

It was great to see Sailability back for the 2nd year, with their inclusive crew on yacht *Blu*. This year's team comprised of four sailors and 3 runners with disability joining, which enabled them to have an inclusive running team running on all 4 Peaks.

The article by Enrico Zanella, on the race sponsored by Solaris Asia, captures the event experience in an Italian style. Enjoy the read and be inspired!



Sailability Parasailors Inclusive Team in ABC Four Peaks Race 2024 sponsored by Solaris Yachts: Solaris One 48 Blu Skipper's report

At 1:18pm, we crossed the finish line after 26 hours and 43 minutes, tired but very happy for our second participation in the competitive challenges of the ABC Four Peaks Race sponsored by Solaris Yachts. It was a tougher and more difficult edition for us than the previous one, characterised by strong winds and flat calms, intermittent rain and penetrating cold, relative to the temperatures of Hong Kong.

The ABC 4 Peaks Race is a multi-sport competition comprising sailing, kayaking and mountain running that was created in 1985 and is still organised by the Aberdeen Boat Club. Solaris Yachts was the sole sponsor of the 2023 and 2024 editions, and will also be the sponsor in 2025, an edition that will be characterised by the participation of runners arriving from other countries around the world. This year, we wanted to use the Solaris One 48 Blu instead of the Solaris 40 Mohan (Senza Limiti) for various reasons, not least, to expand the experience of our Parasailors Racing Team. We therefore adapted a special chair to allow our helmsman Mark, who has muscular dystrophy, to carry out his precious task, which undertook in an absolutely remarkable way, proving an always concentrating helmsman with very good technique. Sylvia, Lung and Ok, who had polio, worked on setting the sails and managing the halyards, so were the sailing team. As for the runners, the team was made up of Camel, lower leg amputee; John, who is hearing impaired; and Celvin, who has autism, along with his mother Alice. The support team consisted of Kay, steward and co-skipper Fred, who has raced all four peaks including the eight kayak sectors, Tai, the boat captain, Ciro, our young sailor; and

finally myself, as skipper and co-owner of *Blu*. We thank the other owner of *Blu*, Reza Cockrell who unfortunately was unable to participate due to lack of space on board. The rules of the regatta impose a maximum of 3 sailors on board and 2 runners for each of the peaks; but we had a special concession because we need people to support the disabled. However, each summit must have an able-bodied person along with the disabled person; in our case the heroic Fred ran all four sectors.

But let's go to the event, starting in the morning of 27 January 2024:

The 5 boats of the IRC class depart first; then, at 10:40am we're in the second group to start, together with another 7 boats in the PHS A class; and after us the 6 boats of the PHS B class head out, making 19 boats in all. For all of us, it's already a success to be here!

The first sector goes from Tai Tam bay to Sai Kung in Port Shelter bay, with a navigation of approximately 26 kilometres (16 miles) for 90% upwind, experiencing variable winds from 9 to 15 knots, contrary currents and strong waves. We start by crossing the line on starboard tack, together with the others more or less all on the same line. After a while, some choose to tack to move towards the centre of the Sheung Sze Mun channel, between Cape d'Aguilar and Beaufort Island.

We leave the TCS2 port side navigation buoy, on our left, at the exit of the Tathong channel, and decide to stay on the right side to go up to the south of Ninepin Island to tack on our layline, the direct route, for Port Shelter bay passing to west of Trio Island. We enter Port Shelter bay heading directly towards Sai Kung in first or second place, with a notable gap from the others; but abeam Shelter Island the wind drops drastically for us and the lottery of the wind gusts begins. We lose this against *Generations*, which is in the same class as us.

At 2:00pm, we arrive at the kayak launch point, to begin the race towards the first peak – Ma On Shan, which requires covering approximately 13 kilometres with a difference in altitude of 702 metres. Kam Hung Fung "Camel" from Hong Kong, known as Blade Runner because he has a carbon laminar prosthesis on his right leg, and Frenchman Frederic "Fred" Vaudaine, *Mohan's* volunteer skipper and a very strong runner who competes on all four Peaks, get into the kayak and after 5 minutes I'm on the ground to start the race towards Ma On Shan. We remain floating with the mainsail open in the Inner Bay, first together with those of the IRC class who have already arrived and then together with the others who have arrived. *Generations* has chosen another landing point at Trio Beach, which however requires a longer ride of a few kilometres.

We hoist the gennaker to be ready to open it as soon as our runners return, and at 5:30pm, after 2 hours and 19 minutes of racing, we are ready to set off, slowly, with mainsail and gennaker towards Repulse Bay, which is about 40 kilometres (25 miles) away.

Just out of the Inner Bay, we are welcomed by 10/15 knots of downwind wind, almost from behind, until the passage of the Ninepin Islands, which we decide to pass north of, to take us on the layline for the passage between the Sung Kong and Waglan islands. As soon as we pass the southern Ninepin island, the wind increases and changes direction to the point that we decide to reopen the jib and lower the orange gennaker with the Solaris Yachts logo.

We leave Sung Kong island on the right and head towards the Sheung Sze Mun channel to reach Bluff Head, leaving Stanley bay on the right and then Chung Hom Kok beach and Round island on the left, before finally entering Repulse Bay at 10:00pm, with the wind varying between 0 and 18 knots upwind and abeam, experiencing wind from the front and from the side. The transfer to land is more complex as Celvin, who is autistic, and his mother Alice sit on a standup board, and Fred tows them with the kayak for at least 150 metres, in favour of the tide.

As soon as they land, their three-person race begins, towards the Violet Hill summit which is about 6 kilometres away, with a difference in altitude of 433 metres – practically all of which involves steps. We remain in the bay, witnessing a drastic drop in the wind, which finally stops as soon as they return on board after hours. The return against the current was particularly hard for Fred, who clambers on board almost exhausted, barely moves for two minutes, then resumes with his usual inexhaustible energy. Running time: 1 hour and 30 minutes.

We set off again at midnight, remaining floating at the mercy of the tide, and after about 1 hour the first gust of wind arrives abeam, taking us out of the bay, where we progressively find 13/15 knots of wind which varies from close hauled to broad reach. We decide not to raise Code 0 and to remain with a reasonable safety margin; we're not here to win and take risks but to complete our inclusive undertaking.

We cross the East Lamma Channel, sailing towards the southern tip of Lamma Island to cross the West Lamma Channel, leaving Cheung Chau and Shek Kwu Chau islands on the right, and then heading north to reach Cheung Sha Beach, starting point for the run up Lantau Peak, which is about 11 kilometres away, with a difference in altitude of 943 metres.

We arrive at the disembarkation point at 04:00am, after about 32 kilometres (20 miles) of navigation, and there are 20/25 knots of gusts of wind. We manage to disembark our heroes. John, who is hearing impaired, and Fred paddle for about 1200 metres before reaching the beach from where their race within the race begins. We stay in the bay with a pinch of mainsail until the wind drops completely. Their race lasts 3 hours and 4 minutes; and at around 07:50 am we set off again with mainsail and jib, and with some flaring from 3 knots of wind upwind we slowly move towards the right side of the bay and hoist the Code 0, which we manage to hold for an hour. Then, the wind turns towards the bow, up to 14/16 knots, and so we close the tail and reopen the jib which makes us fly with four tacks towards Ha Mei Wan bay, Lamma, to disembark the runners at Lo So Shing beach after about 19 kilometres (12 miles) of navigation. It's now around 10:00am on 28 January.

The move involves Tai and Fred on the kayak, and Celvin and his mother Alice sitting on the standup board. John should have climbed this peak, but unfortunately has an inflamed tendon, so Celvin and Alice offered themselves as replacements. Tai will bring the kayak and standup board back on board, because we will pick the mother and son up on the other side of Lamma island at Mo Tat beach, after about 13 kilometres (8 miles) of navigation. This sea route is akin to a half circuit of Lamma, which you can choose to do clockwise or anti-clockwise, covering about 13 kilometres (8 miles) either way. We and another boat choose to go around clockwise, others the opposite way. Our choice will prove to be by far the winning one.

At around 12:00pm, we arrive at Mo Tat and wait for our runners to arrive, which they do after 1 hour and 56 minutes of running and a few minutes due to misunderstandings about the meeting point. French mysteries!

Half an hour later, we set off again for the last 5 kilometres (3 miles) to cross the finish line, which we pass at 1:18pm on Sunday 28 January 2024; later than hoped thanks to a spiteful wind that made us suffer a lot. Today is also Sylvia's birthday, and for sure this is the best gift she receives!

I want to underline the great work by the Parasailors Team, who never gave up even for a minute, continuing to adjust the sails and steer the boat; Mark spent practically 25 hours at the helm. The same applies to our para runners, and the sheer effort they put into the race.

We dedicate this undertaking of ours to Mike Rawbone, the late co-founder of Sailability together with his wife Kay, who was always with us and welcomed us upon our arrival at the finish line with many butterflies. Without their love, their sense of solidarity, their passion and compassion, and their concrete vision of a better humanity, we probably would not have been able to face this great adventure together, in a truly inclusive and consolidated team today more than ever.

One last note: everyone on board has learned to use a magical expression that can mean you are doing well, you are doing badly, what are you doing?, you are doing well!, you are smart and many other things even how stupid you are! The magic words are: Mamma mia!!!

Thanks to all the competitors, the ABC team, Yilina Liu and her team, and to Solaris Yachts – and good luck to everybody! See you in the ABC Four Peaks Race 2025, sponsored by Solaris Yachts!

Another Fine Contest as ABC's Premier Race Series Enters 20th Year

The Aberdeen Boat Club's Waglan Series covers two seasons and spans two years. It features 12 scheduled races, four of which are windward / leewards, and eight are islands courses. The name was inspired by the iconic lighthouse on Waglan Island – for more than a century and a quarter, a welcoming sight for seafarers approaching Hong Kong.

Waglan Island (Wang Lan) is part of the Po Toi group in Hong Kong's southeastern waters. Its light was first lit in 1893 and is still used as a navigational beacon to this day. It could not be a better name for a yacht racing series, and even

the main bar of one of Hong Kong's major sailing clubs!

Conceived in 2004 by the Club's rear commodore sailing, Barry Hill, it attracts boats from all around the territory, with by far the largest contingent coming from the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club. Fleets of 30 competitors are guite common. Take Race 7 of the Waglan Series 2023-24, for example: 31 boats entered, 27 showed up for the start off Middle Island. Some big names, too - Neo One, Next, Wild Card, Kikukie's Dream II, *Arcturus*+ – along with regular campaigners Generations, Intrigue, Shun Shui and the Hans Christian classic, Bowline, racing under the relatively new Performance Handicap System.

Conditions were mild early on 14 January 2024; but race officer Alex Johnston was confident that things would improve. He was right. Course 17 was set for both IRC and PHS – L for the faster boats (20 nautical miles) and S for the cruisers (14.6 nautical miles). The longer course would see the faster boats braving the swells off Cape d'Aguilar and rounding Shek O Rock, whereas the cruisers would leave Fury Rocks to starboard before heading back to a Tai Tam Mark, and home to a finish off Round Island. The same finale for IRC.

Approaching the committee boat at 1020, Pascal Martin helming *Skywalker* signed in late, confirmed by assistant race officer, Jennifer Li. *Skywalker*, a Jeanneau 42-footer, managed to score a 6th in PHS A. And the happy crew of *Muxu* wished the management team a "Happy New Year!" as they prepared for the start.

Although classified as a 'Casual' entry, it was also good to see the old *Redeye*, under new ownership, back on the course and competing with the best in IRC. *Redeye* was formerly owned by the late Paul Leese and represented the Aberdeen Boat Club at many of Hong Kong's key sailing events.

The RO laid one of his famously long start lines, together with a windward mark in towards Repulse Bay. This time, having sorted out their ammunition problems, the race management was able to give both fleets a loud 'bang' for their starts and finishes – a gun is by far the best way to energize a fleet of racing machines and add more excitement to a boisterous start!

Not only was it the first race of 2024, but Race 7 was the first in Mini Series 2. Basically, the 12race Waglan Series is divided into two 'mini' series – one in the first year, one in the second year, each consisting of six races. Those who couldn't make all the races in Mini Series 1, for example, had a chance to make it in Mini Series 2. Or the other way around. For a six-month event, starting in early October and ending in late March the following year, this split has definite advantages for itinerant crews and those with business commitments and, of course, there are the traditional holidays at Christmas, New Year and Lunar New Year when many people leave town.







The RO made his welcoming address at 10:40, and warned everyone to stay out of the Lamma Traffic Separation Scheme. At 11:00, the gun went for the 11 boats in IRC A and B gathered mostly at the pin end and, five minutes later, 15 starters in PHS gathered momentum as they headed for the windward mark. There was plenty of enthusiasm in both starts – it seems everybody was out to begin the Year of the Dragon on a high note!

Around the windward mark, the boats began to spread out, with *Kikukie's Dream II* and *Wild Card* leading the way. As expected, the wind began to increase and the IRC boats were soon around Chung Hom Kok and passing the Tai Tam Mark.

In 8 knots of easterly breeze, all boats reveled in the conditions and the management team was soon recording finishing times. *Tipsy Easy* with its long waterline romped home in 2 hours, 3 minutes and 52 seconds. On handicap, the IRC 1 Division was won by *Redeye*, followed by *Wild Card* and *Neo One*. IRC 2 saw seasoned campaigner, *Intrigue*, ahead of *Zesst* and Stefan Fillip's *Neo One*.

In PHS A, *Five O One* performed well to win on handicap, with *Tipsy Easy* 2nd and *Generations* 3rd. *Boss* retired.

Sammy Wong's *Ganyibei*, a newcomer to the racing scene, won PHS B, with *Easy Breezy II* and *Bowline* 3rd. *Water Rabbit* was the last PHS boat home at 14:03:33; but last to finish Race 7 of the Waglan Series 2023-24 was the unfortunate *2 Easy*. Ah well, better luck next time, Tiger.

Races 8 & 9 of the Waglan Series 2023-24 will be held on 18 February 2024.


